


Welcome to our quarterly newsletter highlighting some of the many ways Abbott is improving lives around the globe.

TOP STORY: Supporting Health Systems and Health Workers

At this year's Concordia Global Summit, we shared updates on two partnerships – one longstanding, one new – focused on strengthening health systems and supporting health workers.

For more than 20 years, Abbott and Abbott Fund have partnered with the Tanzanian government to improve healthcare, including transforming emergency care. In 2010, we opened Tanzania's first Emergency Medicine Department and residency training program. Within two years, mortality dropped by 40% – and today, this partnership has provided care to 1.3 million people. At the summit, we hosted a panel session that brought together the pioneering doctors who made it happen, and also premiered a <u>new video</u> highlighting the life-saving impact of this work.

In a separate session, we joined Seed Global Health on stage to talk about supporting the essential role of health workers – and introduced a new partnership to do just that in Malawi. 


